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Restaurant Scores Now Available Online

As a convenience to residents, the City of North Richland Hills is now posting restaurant inspection scores online at www.nrhtx.com. To view the latest scores, go to the "Online Services" tab on the left side of the page and select "Restaurant Inspection Scores."

There are approximately 300 licensed food service establishments in North Richland Hills including full service restaurants, fast food, grocery stores, convenience stores, child care facilities and temporary food service events. The city's Consumer Health Division inspects each establishment 1 to 4 times per year.

The inspections are scored using a demerit system in accordance with the Texas Food Establishment Guidelines. It is important to remember that the scores represent only a snapshot of the facility at the time the inspector arrived. The conditions could be better or worse while an inspector is not present.

New inspection scores will be posted online monthly. Residents can sign up to receive e-mail notifications when new scores are available.

North Richland Hills' Credit Rating Upgraded

Earlier this year, citing the City's consistently strong financial performance, Standard and Poor's Rating Services (S&P) raised its rating on North Richland Hills debt from 'AA-' to 'AA.' The 'AA' rating means lower bills for municipal capital projects and improvements because it allows the City to borrow money at lower interest rates.

"We're excited to receive an upgrade in the rating," said Mayor Oscar Trevino. "Few Texas communities have a higher rating. This puts us in the top echelon of local governments and will ultimately save North Richland Hills taxpayers money."

The City of North Richland Hills credit ratings fall in the top 2% of municipalities in the State of Texas and the top 10% nationwide. Moody's Investor Services also reaffirmed the City's Aa3 rating with their firm.

S&P's analysts stated that their AA rating reflects the City's continued tax base and economic diversification and consistently strong financial performance, despite ongoing capital needs related to growth.

"The City consistently reports strong financial performance while addressing growth-related capital needs," said Standard and Poor's credit analyst Kate Choban.

City Manager Larry Cunningham said the City Council and staff are to be commended for the strategic planning, leadership and wise use of resources that has contributed to the rating upgrade and the strength of the

City's financial condition.

"We have told our residents that fiscal responsibility is one of our primary goals," Mr. Cunningham said. "Our good credit rating and the interest savings we will realize are proof that we are meeting that goal."

On April 28, North Richland Hills received an interest rate of 3.67 percent for the sale of \$4.18 million in General Obligation Bonds. The bonds will be used for projects from the 2003 bond election including improvements to North Tarrant Parkway, Rufe Snow Drive and Douglas Lane. A portion of this funding is also for the improvements at the intersection of Holiday Lane and Dick Lewis Drive.

The City also received an interest rate of 3.82 percent for the sale of \$4.75 million in Certificates of Obligation. These funds will be used for water and sewer system improvements, the replacement of an ambulance, drainage improvements at Iron Horse Golf Course, the design of a new attraction at NRH₂O, and the design of a new recreation center.

Finance Director Larry Koonce said having high investment grade credit ratings from Standard and Poor's and Moody's Investor Services helped the City lock in low interest rates for these sales.

"These ratings are the stamp of approval that reflects our credit worthiness and demonstrates our strong financial condition to those interested in purchasing our bonds," Mr. Koonce said.

Important Reminder About Water Conservation

The City of North Richland Hills reminds residents that efficient water use is important all the time – not just during times of drought.

Remember, **no watering** is allowed **between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., except by hand or soaker hose.** All sprinkler systems should be set to operate in the early morning or late evening, when the sun and temperatures are less likely to cause evaporation. Rain and freeze sensors are required on all new irrigation systems. This conserves water by automatically preventing sprinklers from watering when it rains or freezes.

Remember, water is a precious natural resource that we must use wisely and protect for future generations. Your cooperation and support plays a critical role in the success of our conservation efforts and we appreciate your help and understanding. Partnering together to conserve water will ensure a continued, secure water source for decades to come. Need help and don't know who to call? 2-1-1 Texas can connect you to community services, ranging from child care to transportation.

Just as 9-1-1 became an easy way to reach emergency medical, police and fire services, 2-1-1 has revolutionized the way Texans access important non-emergency services. When dialing 2-1-1, callers can talk to an information and referral specialist who will assess their needs and refer them to an appropriate service provider. 2-1-1 is available 24-hours a day.

Preventive Street Maintenance Continues

The NRH Public Works Department is continuing to extend the life of our older City streets. This year, 50 streets are included in the Preventive Street Maintenance Program. This work has already begun and should be completed by December 2008.

Asphalt overlays will be completed on 5.67 lane miles. This consists of applying a 2 to 3 inch layer of hot mix asphalt on the street to level and waterproof the roadway.

Slurry seal will be applied to 8.53 lane miles. Slurry seal is a mixture of oil and crushed rock. When the mixture is applied it bonds to the pavement, sealing the street and increasing skid resistance.

A crack seal treatment will be applied to 9.17 lane miles. This consists of sealing the cracks in the pavement to prevent moisture from penetrating into the base and subgrade material.

Streets included in the maintenance program are listed to the right. Some lane closures may be required in conjunction with this work. The City urges drivers to use caution and obey warning signs when work crews are on the road.

New Playground Equipment Coming to Northfield Park

During their July 14th meeting, the North Richland Hills City Council agreed to purchase new playground equipment for Northfield Park. The existing playground equipment, in place since the park opened in 1987, will be removed and replaced with new equipment including a modular climbing / sliding structure for five to twelve year olds, and a smaller-scaled play system with slides for younger children. New swings will also be installed and minor updates will be made to the parking lot, restrooms and drinking fountains. The improvements are expected to be completed by early September.

Did You Know?

The City has budgeted \$800,000 for the Preventive Street Maintenance Program this year. Since the program was first established in 1995 the City has: resurfaced 65 lane miles of street pavement on 186 streets; slurry sealed 58 lane miles of street pavement on 152 streets; and crack sealed 148 streets.

Program Aims to Increase Recycling At Special Events

The City of North Richland Hills' Neighborhood Services Department is launching a new recycling bin loan program to increase recycling at community events. This new program will allow schools, nonprofits, and other community organizations to "check out" recycle bins for use at festivals, athletic competitions and other special events.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, approximately 40 percent of solid waste taken to local landfills is generated when people are away from home. Much of that waste is generated at special events produced by local cities, schools, and other organizations. The bin loan program is an effort to divert a portion of this waste from going to the landfill by increasing recycling opportunities for the public at special events.

"These events not only offer places for people to have fun, but they also provide great recycling opportunities for many materials generated by the public, vendors, concessionaires, and exhibitors," says Debbie York, NRH Neighborhood Services Manager. "We want to make it easy for residents to use their good recycling habits when they go to a concert in the park, sporting activity, school carnival or any other special event."

Many organizations lack funding to purchase large numbers of recycle bins for events, or lack space in which

to store bins year-round for only occasional use. By removing these barriers, the City hopes the bin loan program will allow more organizations to offer recycling opportunities at their events.

Starting this fall, the Neighborhood Services Department will provide special event planners with a complete tool kit to make recycling easy and effective at their events. There will not be a charge to use the items, however, a deposit to cover replacement costs of the bins will be required. NRH staff will deliver and pick up the trailer of supplies for large events.

Public Service Officers Assist Police Department with Non-Emergency Calls

The North Richland Hills Police Department is excited to announce the introduction of the revamped Public Service Officer Program. Public Service Officers are civilian employees of the Police Department, recently assigned to the Uniformed Services Division. The purpose of the Public Service Officer Program is to provide efficient, effective, and excellent police services to the community. The Public Service Officers will focus upon tasks which do not require a police officer.

Public Service Officers will respond to non-emergency calls for service. They will take reports of crimes that have already occurred either in person or by telephone. Public Service Officers will help facilitate the Beat Management Program by working closely with members of the public and the district officers to solve problems. Public Service Officers will also actively assist police officers at major accident and crime scenes. Other duties performed by the Public Service Officers will include collecting fingerprints, investigating abandoned vehicle complaints, and parking complaints.



The Public Service Officers will be easily identifiable. They will operate a blue Chevrolet Impala with a Department logo on both the driver and passenger doors, and yellow overhead lights. Their uniform will consist of a black shirt with the North Richland Hills logo embroidered, tan pants and duty belt.

Resolution Encourages Gas Companies to Locate Pipelines Away from NRH Neighborhoods

As the development of the Barnett Shale natural gas field continues, communities throughout Tarrant County and North Texas continue to receive plans for new gas drilling sites and new gas pipelines. In North Richland Hills, natural gas wells have already been drilled on private property near the intersection of Hightower Drive and Rufe Snow Drive, and additional wells may be drilled at other locations in the future.

Gas gathering and distribution pipelines are necessary to carry natural gas from drilling sites to markets, and therefore gas companies are working to acquire easements and plan for their gas pipeline distribution systems. While these companies have legal rights to acquire property as a public utility, the City believes it is in everyone's best interest for gas pipeline companies to be courteous and fair in their dealings with property owners, and to limit conflicts with neighborhoods and prime commercial areas as much as possible.

The North Richland Hills City Council recently approved a resolution encouraging all gas pipeline companies to:

- establish major pipeline alignments within

existing utility and roadway corridors in accordance with the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan;

- have an open dialog with property owners and citizens for establishing pipeline easements on private properties;
- utilize direct boring where possible and bury all pipelines a minimum of 5 feet in depth throughout the city;
- establish pipeline easements away from residential neighborhoods and on the peripheries of prime commercial properties in an effort to protect the value and potential use of all properties.

Pipelines on private property are regulated by state and federal laws and are not directly regulated by cities. However, the City of North Richland Hills does have the right to establish license agreements for pipelines that cross city owned properties or public roadways and rights of way.

Local Economic Indicators Remain Positive

People all across the country are feeling the pressures of a dwindling economy. With gas and food prices rising, uncertainty in the stock market, and the rise in foreclosures it is no surprise that citizens are concerned. The following information will hopefully put you at ease, as it relates to our local economy.

- Gas prices have hit all time highs; however, North Richland Hills is approximately 7¢ below the state average and 21¢ below the national average for gasoline.
- The unemployment rate is at 3.4%, which is below the rate recorded at the same time last year. It is also well below both the state's rate of 4.3% and country's rate of 5.3%.
- At mid-year, the City has had 50 new businesses open their doors. This is on track to match or exceed last

year's new business number.

- The City has also seen an increase in the number of commercial construction permits. As of May, 38 permits had been given. In the same time period last year, the City had issued only 26 permits.
- With 19,644 homes located in North Richland Hills presently, less than 1% of the City's homes are under foreclosure.
- The North Central Texas Council of Governments released its new population figure for North Richland Hills of 65,750, which is an increase of 2.65% over last year's number of 64,050.

Reminder to Pet Owners

The NRH Humane Division reminds residents that dogs and cats are not allowed to run loose in the City. **Dogs should be kept indoors, in a fenced yard, or on a leash at all times. All cats should be kept indoors.**

To prevent the spread of rabies and to increase the chances of returning lost pets to their owners, NRH City ordinance requires that all cats and dogs be vaccinated for rabies and licensed with the City. Wildlife in NRH

From time to time residents may see wildlife in their neighborhoods, including a wide variety of birds, mammals and reptiles. While some residents enjoy these animals as part of nature, others may feel they are a nuisance.

Many wild animals are very smart and hard to trap. The best solution is to remove items that attract these animals to your yard.

Remove food and water sources including pet food and bird feeders. Store garbage in metal or heavy plastic containers with tight lids and don't leave it out overnight. Don't give animals a place to hide. Keep the grass cut short. Remove weeds and debris. Raise wood piles up off the ground on a rack. Clean out storage sheds and garages and use shelving to store items up off the floor. Inspect your home, foundation and eaves and seal any holes.
